The game thrives because it is so challenging and the seemingly easy task of getting the ball into the hole is actually difficult. Good golf demands patience, practice and skill. That's why the game fascinates millions of people, both those who actively play and those who interestedly just watch the game.

Is there a right age to start the game? My answer is; the best age to start in golf is the time you are interested to play the game.

No one ever truly masters golf, not even those in List A. More so, not those in List B.

Everyone is always trying to improve and that's part of the game's appeal. Golfers continuously try to gain intimacy with

the golf course, like we do with our relationships in life.

Golf provides opportunities to spend time in some of nature's loveliest settings, with the people and friends whose company we enjoy. It is all the opposite to be effective and to enjoy the game of golf. It requires a different pace and frame of mind than our regular normal lives. It is a refreshing change. It is, in a way, a measure of our concentration, like during our personal prayer time or when reading the word of God,

For some people, like in List A, golf is a real passion – it is like their spouse. For others, like in List B, golf is more casual - like a good friend. But the basic principles of relationship are the same. Even though you don't see a friend as often as a spouse, you feel you want to show him/her similar care and attention, kindness, if you will, whenever you have the chance to play together. Golf is truly a wonderful game to share with someone, with people you care about. We recognize this all too well in Rotary. In District 3800 we have a season of 8 to 9 golf tournaments and fellowship each Rotary year.

One day, spouse Merci and son Michael had to attend a community activity at Ateneo. Older daughter Leah and I went to play golf together. Younger daughter Bea drove the golf cart for us with cold drinks, snacks and a book to read in between. We shared the agonies of wayward drives, the getting out of sand traps and the missed short putts. But we valued the delightful hours we shared in the golf course, the closeness we had from playing together. That was one fun day we look forward doing again and again.

THE MAKING OF THE GLOBAL MUSIC VIDEO

Before flying to San Diego last January 2010, DG Jun and I met with Rtn. Raffy Amaranto to inform him that we are engaging his services in producing the District Theme Song for the year 2010-2011. Rtn. Raffy of RC San Juan West, has produced the theme songs of the District for the past eight (8) years now. We told him that we will email him the International Theme and the Thrusts for 2010-2011, right after it is announced during the opening of the International Assembly. And so we did.

When we came home in February, we again requested for a meeting with Rtn. Raffy. There, he told us that he has adopted the tune of *Mama Mia* by ABBA. He also mentioned that he was amazed that the intended lyrics, which depict the theme and thrust of RI for 2010-2011 have matched the tune of the said song. We liked the musical arrangement done by Raffy. Then we told him, *"You know Raffy, it is our dream that we come up with a music video just like what we see in TV and also because this is the 'In' thing"*. Raffy replied, *"You have to put your heart into it so that it will become a reality"*.

March, April and May passed by so quickly because of the PETS and DISTAS and Gov. Jun and I were very busy meeting with the host clubs of these activities. Then came June, and the Handover Ceremonies on July 1 was fast approaching.

On June 15, we called on the Global Presidents (GPs) for the MTV Orientation. About 22 of them came and Raffy called them the "main participants" (MPs). He showed the actions and explained the symbolism of the actions (see article by Rtn. Raffy). DG Jun and I started practicing with the MPs. The following night, four GPs namely, Carla Dejeres, Wit Bello, Dodgie Leyva, Ric Yu including DG Jun and I met at the studio to do the recording of the song. We were very impressed with the present technology because our voices sounded like a chorale.

After three days, we began shooting the choreography. This time, there were around 57 GPs who joined including the 22 MPs. We first formed a human theme logo at the grounds of the Marikina Rotary Youth Center and an aerial shot of the logo was taken from the tall building beside Rotary Center. Then we all went to shoot the rest of the choreography in Timberland Nature and Sports Club in San Mateo, Rizal. When we arrived there at around 10 am, the sun was up, but the presidents gamely followed the instructions of Rtn. Raffy. The hottest time was at 11:30 am and 2:00 pm and I was really praying hard that no one will suffer from heat stroke. During the shoot, we changed attire three times, we wore T-shirts with colors of either royal blue, yellow or aqua blue, then the white top and denim and finally the "global barong". We finished shooting at 4:30 pm. There were other GPs who wanted to join the MTV so we set another shooting at the Crowne Plaza hotel two days after the first shooting. Looking back, it only took one week to do the recording, practice the choreography and do the shooting. Then we gave our Technical Director, Mr. Noel Argosino, another week to do the finished product. And when we saw it, we were really delighted with the outcome of the first ever MTV of District 3800. We are forever grateful to all the Global Presidents, Rtn. Raffy and Mr. Argosino for making this dream a reality!

The Global Music Video is the legacy of the Global Team to our District. We have again raised the bar of excellence when it comes to team work and hard work. Yes it was difficult but it can be done and we did it as a team. Truly, it was another "Go Go Global" accomplishment and feather in the cap of the Global Team.

December is Family of Rotary Month. To many Rotarians, family of rotary means spouses, brothers, sisters, parents and children. Their contribution to Rotary and the influence and support that they give to Rotarians are definitely very much appreciated. Rotary Clubs benefit immensely also when they strive to achieve a balance between Rotarians and their families, enhancing home lives and family interaction. Aside from close relations, however, the family of rotary also includes those who are involved in Rotary's work from The Rotary Foundation alumni to participants in Rotary youth programs in thousand of communities around the world.

I. CLUB REMINDERS

1. Ensure timely submission of your duly accomplished SAR and remittance of payments for the first semester Semi Annual dues - US\$ 25.50 per member.
2. Remit payment for the first semester subscription to the Philippine Rotary Magazine - Php 270.00 per member.
3. Monthly club attendance report should be submitted to the District not later than 15 days from the last club meeting day for the month. The District Attendance Chair is IPP Paola Acebedo of the RC Sampaguita Grace Park.
4. The December exchange rate for all transactions with Rotary International is still at Php 44.00 to 1 US\$.
5. President's Monthly Report (PMR) is to be submitted not later than the 15th of the following month to your respective Assistant Governors. They should review the report and affix their signatures. Also, submit two copies/issues of your weekly bulletin together with your PMR.
6. The deadline for members to be counted in the performance award is December 31, 2010
7. Governor's visits are still ongoing. As initially advised, the presentation of the Rotary Clubs who are yet to be visited by the District Governor, should focus on achievement/performance of the club of its plans and programs for the last five months.
8. The survey sheet for the Midyear Review 2011 has just been released to all Global Presidents. The filled up forms should be submitted to the District Office at the Marikina Rotary Youth Center not later than January 3, 2011. The data will be used in the presentation by the respective Committee Chairperson during the review scheduled on January 29, 2011.
9. District Nominating Committee (DNC)
 - a. The guidelines for the District 3800 election for the DGN for the RY 2013-14 has already been released last September 15, 2010 by the Governor. The following are the key dates:

- i. November 15, 2010 - Deadline for the submission of the club resolution or the eligibility of the club's nominee and nominee's acceptance.
- ii. January 5, 2011 - Deadline for submission of official nomination
- iii. January 8, 2011 - Notification of clubs of the composition of the DNC
- iv. January 17, 2011 - Convening of the DNC
- v. January 28, 2011 - Results of the DNC
- vi. February 14, 2011 - Announcement of the unchallenged nominee
- vii. June 30, 2011 - Submission of the name of the DGN to RI
